Rector's Bubble

These days, I see a lot of hearts and the color red just about anywhere I go. In Wal-Mart, for example, there are plenty of heart-shaped balloons,

candies, and stuffed toys put on display. In Walgreens, cards decorated with hearts dominate card aisle. I believe all of us know the reason for this: Valentine's Day is coming.

The heart has become the most popular symbol for love. Valentine's Day has become a day most associated with love, and a day in which we express our love to those who are dear to us. This year, Lent comes a week after Valentine's Day. And what a wonderful segue! How appropriate it is that we are surrounded with hearts because Lent is ultimately about love.

Lent is a time of preparation for the celebration of the Lord's passion, death, and resurrection. These are events in the Lord's life in which he expresses to us in a powerful way his great love for us. We normally associate Lent with penance, self-sacrifice, fasting and abstinence. However, if we truly reflect on the essence of the season and think about why we observe these practices, we will realize that we do them because we love the Lord. We show that love by being in solidarity with him, by sharing in his suffering, and by dying to ourselves so that we may share in his redemptive work and in the glory of his resurrection.

As we receive the mark of ashes on our foreheads, we are thus reminded to take the time to examine our hearts, to reorient our hearts, and to refocus our hearts to God. There are many ways in which we can go about doing this. Most often people think of giving something up such as unhealthy food or drinks, unnecessary spending, or excessive use of electronic devices. The Gospel reading for Ash Wednesday, however, focuses on three familiar and time-honored practices: prayer, fasting and abstinence, and alms. These are wonderful ways of preparing our hearts for Lent.

The Prophet Joel speaks of returning to the Lord with our whole heart. Saint Paul urges us to be reconciled to God. And Jesus reminds us of the importance of having humility when observing penitential practices. In Psalm 51, the Psalmist sums these all up when he says, "A clean heart create for me, O God. (Ps. 51:12)" So let us spend these next 40 days in Lent showing our love for the Lord, preparing our hearts for him and making them pleasing before God.

ICE, ICE, BABY






Holy Orders The Hill Nicholas Dean ('23)
