

Rector's

On Sunday, May 21, the Universal Church will celebrate the great solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord. Having accomplished

his mission on earth, Jesus leaves his disciples and his mother on earth and returns to his Father in heaven. Jesus did so because he wanted to prepare a place for us in his Father's house. At the Last Supper, Jesus made this promise to his disciples: "In my Father's house there are many dwelling places. If there were not, would I have told you that I am going to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come back again and take you to myself, so that where I am you also may be." (John 14:2-3)

The feast of the Ascension points to our ultimate destiny. As Jesus returns to our Father in heaven, so too shall we return to him one day. Returning home to the Father was the end point of Jesus' life on earth. It will be so for us as well. Saint Augustine, in his autobiography, Confessions, speaks about union with God as man's ultimate destiny. In perhaps the most famous line in the book, Saint Augustine addresses God saying, "Our heart is restless until it finds its rest in you." Our faith teaches us that communion with God in heaven is the destiny paved for all of us by Jesus Christ.

There is something else about this feast that has urgent implications for us. The feast of the Ascension also reminds us of our common mission. Saint Luke describes the scenario in which the apostles, after seeing Jesus lifted up into heaven and disappeared from their sight, were admonished by two men, believed to be angels, who say to them, "Men of Galilee, why are you standing there looking at the sky? This Jesus who has been taken up from you will return in the same way you have seen him go." (Acts 1:11) The followers of Jesus are not supposed to stand idly by. They are supposed to do something. They are supposed to continue the work that Jesus has started: to proclaim the Kingdom of God and make disciples of all nations.

As disciples of Jesus, we share in the mission entrusted by our Lord to his apostles. The Holy Spirit empowers us and emboldens us to continue the Lord's work in our time. We are not to stand idly by. We are not to waste any moment. Instead, we are to roll up our sleeves and get to work. We are to get busy as the work is not finished. There is still much more to be done to help bring the Kingdom of God to its fullness.

As we are about to conclude this school year, let us take moment to pause and look back. Let us recognize the work we have done, celebrate our accomplishments, and acknowledge areas for further growth and improvement. May our brief respite during summer break refresh, renew, and reinvigorate us for the work that awaits in the new school year. It has been a couple of years since students from Germany have had the opportunity of participating in the German exchange program. The connection between St. Lawrence and Collegium Johanneum allows students from SLS and Germany to visit each other's countries. The program alternates yearly, with students from Germany visiting SLS to SLS students visiting Germany.

The German students first arrived at the U.S. Capitol, Washington, D.C., before traveling to Mount Calvary. In D.C., they went sightseeing, were educated on the U.S., and explored more than just SLS in little Mt. Calvary, WI. After spending a few days in D.C., they took a flight to Chicago arriving at O'Hare airport, one step closer to their final destination. Mr. Kevin Buelow, the German teacher at SLS, picked up the visitors from Chicago. When they arrived at SLS, the students and staff greeted them with loud applause.

During their visit to the Hill, the Germans actively interacted with students, playing many different sports and enjoying Lower Saint Anthony's game room with foosball and Ping-Pong. They also helped with the maple syrup project, which they could take back home. The Germans also participated in a special school event, a soccer tournament, and had a blast! On the weekend, a few students from SLS assisted the Germans with shopping at the Fox River Mall in Appleton. This was a new experience for the Germans, as they did not have the variety of stores that were in America. The SLS students shared their interests in shopping by introducing new snacks and types of foods along with fashion in America.

The Germans also experienced a Brewers game and the Harley-Davidson museum. Diego Soto ('25) stated, "We went to a Milwaukee Brewers game where they played the New York Mets. The game ended with a walk-off home run; the Brewers won with a final score of 7-6. I introduced Leo to a Polish hotdog and got myself a Nacho Helmet! Later that day, we went to the Harley-Davidson Museum. The Germans were surprised at how many different designs of motorcycles there were." Philipp, one of the German students, enjoyed SLS and said, "Saint Lawrence is very different from my school, and the schedules are very different, not my usual one-and-a-half-hour periods. What I really liked about SLS was the close connections the students shared with teachers. You guys are not afraid of talking to the teachers. My favorite part of the visit was the baseball game. This was a really good experience for me."









The Germans' stay lasted into our Easter break, so a few SLS students in German classes and their families hosted the visitors for the Easter weekend. Daniel Pizaña ('25) hosted Leo and said, "Easter break was great! Leo was very nice and funny. We took him downtown to see the city, which allowed him to see the things that make Chicago, Chicago. We also took him to the Skydeck in Willis Tower and to Chinatown, where we ate Korean Fried Chicken, which was delicious."

Salvador-Diego Gonzalez ('25) took three German visitors home with him: Dana, Philina and Liana. Sal stated, "On Friday, we played Monopoly till five in the morning. On Saturday, we baked until five in the morning, and on Sunday, we played UNO until four in the morning. I met up with Jake [Seeling] and the people he hosted. We went to the city and visited Navy Pier, where two of the Germans went on a boat ride and three on the Ferris wheel. We also saw the bean. They were really interesting to talk to; I had a great time." Jake Regalado-Seeling ('25) hosted Melina and Luzie and told about his experience, "I took them to downtown Chicago, through trains and buses so they got the public transportation experience. It was fun, and I know they also had fun because they told me they did. They said it was a good experience. At my house, we sort of let them do whatever they wanted, but we had family dinners, which let us get to know them better." The German visitors experienced SLS life; some said it was very different from what they were used to. They each had a different adventure when they went home to the host families. They could eat new foods; some said they never had Mexican food, and their expressions showed it. SLS welcomed the German students and chaperones with open arms and gave them an unforgettable experience. Next year the table will turn, and SLS German students will have the opportunity to participate in the exchange program and experience Germany.



But funerals are not necessarily so woeful. It is an occasion to remember the life, the work, and the impact of the deceased. Sure, it is sad, but it is also uplifting to see that even though physically the individual is gone, their legacy will last a long time.

On March 14th, students and staff of St. Lawrence Seminary, along with guests and family members, filled St. Lawrence's humble chapel to give Fr. John Holly

a final earthly farewell.

After graduating from St. Lawrence in 1971, he soon joined the Capuchins and was ordained a priest in 1980.

Before returning to St. Lawrence, he served in several Capuchin ministries throughout the Midwest. In 2012, he was appointed as Rector of St.

Lawrence. The old St. Joseph Hall burned down during his leadership.

Several building projects were commenced and finished throughout his time as Rector, making St. Lawrence better than when he first arrived. He retired in 2017 and was succeeded by Fr. Zoy Garibay.

Reflecting on the life of his predecessor, Fr. Zoy said, "Fr. John was very fraternal and a team player. I have known Fr. John as a Vocations Director, Guardian, and Rector. Fr. John gave his very best in all that he did, and his efforts yielded good fruits for the Capuchin Province of St. Joseph, for the community, and for SLS. Fr. John truly was an

inspiration to me." Another staff member who served alongside Fr. John, Mr. Kevin Buelow, commented, "We joined the Administration at the same time, so I have a lot of fond memories of him. He was compassionate and always looking out for the students, especially through the building projects." He certainly impacted a significant number of people throughout his service.

His impact could not have been summarized better than at his funeral Mass. During the homily, Fr. Bill Hugo simply welcomed everyone whom Fr. John had

ever had the pleasure of working with or for and those whom he called family. The list was

staggering, and it clearly demonstrated the depth of the goodness of Fr. John's life.


From students of St. Lawrence past and present to Capuchin brothers young and old, and his relatives near and far. And it was far.
